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1. Curriculum and Credit Framework for UG Programmes under Semester System

1. Discipline Specific Core Courses (DSC) Credits: 4

These are the **compulsory primary foundation papers** of your selected main subjects. At the beginning, a student will study two main subjects, **Subject-A and Subject-B**. By the end of the second semester, student will formally choose a **Single Major** out of these two.

2. Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Credits: 4

These are **specialized elective papers** offered strictly within the major discipline. DSE courses allow the students to pick advanced or career-oriented specializations within Subject-A or Subject-B during the later semesters of the degree.

3. Minor Courses (MC) Credits: 4

Subjects studied alongside the Major to provide breadth and secondary expertise. A student will pick a secondary subject (**Subject-C**). Additionally, University rules state that the DSC papers of the subject student did *not* choose as his/her Major from the first year automatically convert into Minors.

4. Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC) | Credits: 3

Subjects chosen from **entirely different academic areas** outside the Major and Minor. In this a science student, might take an MDC from Humanities or Commerce.

5. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) | Credits: 3

Hands-on, practical papers designed to offer **hands-on training and employability skills**. Every department hosts a pool of SECs. However, the university guidelines dictate that the first two skill courses (**SEC-1 and SEC-2**) must be directly **chosen from the core or minor disciplines** to build industry readiness in the same field.

6. Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) | Credits: 2

Mandatory competency-focused papers designed to improve **language, communication, and analytical skills**. These are chosen from a university-wide centralized pool. They primarily include courses like English, Hindi and Sanskrit.

7. Internship / Apprenticeship / Project / Community Outreach | Credits: 4

Experiential, **field-based learning** modules that shift education outside the traditional classroom. Managed under explicit University guidelines, students engage in practical training. This involves working with local industries, conducting minor research projects, or participating in **state-centric community outreach** programmes across Himachal Pradesh.

8. Value Addition Courses (VAC) | Credits: 2

Common foundational courses designed to cultivate **holistic and ethical development**. These are selected from a general pool. They cover critical societal topics mandated by the University, including **Environmental**

Education (climate change, wildlife conservation) and **Value-Based Education** (constitutional values, civic duties, and life skills).

9. Overall Graduate Degree Exit Benchmarks

All credits the student earn across these categories are deposited directly into their mandatory **Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) ID**. University awards certificates based on the total credits accumulated by the student.

- ❖ **Undergraduate Certificate:** Awarded after completing 1 Year (**44 Credits**).
- ❖ **Undergraduate Diploma:** Awarded after completing 2 Years (**86 Credits**).
- ❖ **Bachelor's Degree:** Awarded after completing 3 Years (**128 Credits**).
- ❖ **Bachelor's Degree with Honours / Research:** Awarded after 4 Years (**168 Credits**)*

Significant Notes

1. The prescribed credit weightage includes Lecture, Tutorial, and Practical components.
2. In the first semester, students will be offered three different subjects within the same stream: A, B, and C (Core and Minor are provided here for illustrative purposes only).
3. At the end of the second semester, each student may choose one of two programmes: the Multi-Disciplinary/Interdisciplinary or Single Core Discipline (Major) programmes. The student choosing the latter will be required to give his/her Major and Minor at the end of the second semester. Such choices, including DSCs made at the end of the second semester, shall remain in effect until the VI semester.
4. **Additional Seats:** The Colleges may create 10% extra seats over and above the sanctioned strength to accommodate the request for a change of major. Any unfilled or vacant seats may be filled with those seeking a change of Major. Preference will be given to those with the highest CGPA and no arrears in the first year/semester.
5. The DSCs of another discipline for the first two semesters of students who opt for Major programmes will be treated as Minors.
6. A DSC offered in one discipline will be treated as a Minor by another. Students can choose Minor Courses from two different subjects, but must earn a minimum of 12 credits in each.
7. MDCs must be selected from a broad discipline/pool of MDCs other than Major and Minor subjects.
8. AEC/VAC/SEC-3 should be chosen from a pool of courses. Every discipline shall provide these courses, some of which will be offered discipline-specific, while the rest can be open to students of all other disciplines. However, the two SECs (SEC-1 & SEC-2) must be chosen from the discipline-specific (Core and Minor).
9. A maximum of two language courses can be opted for as Core and Minor. AECs should be in a language other than what is studied in DSCs/Minors.
10. I/A/P/C will be determined at the end of the first semester to enable students to carry out some I/A/P/C activities during winter vacation.
11. To pursue an Honours & Honours with research in the 4th year, students will have to successfully complete 3-year UG Degree and choose only one discipline in both semesters, in which s/he have studied 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs in the first three years.
12. A student who secures 75% or more marks in aggregate till semester 6 (up to a 3-year degree) shall be eligible for a 4-year degree Honours with Research, provided HPU has approved the college to offer it.
13. One course per semester (DSC/Minor/MDC/SEC/etc) from a subject offered in two (or more) different programs (e.g. BCA and BSc/ BPA and BA/ BFA and BA/ Shastri and BA/etc) must be the same.
14. Students in the BA programmes can opt for only one DSC each from the Bachelor of Performing Arts (Dance, Music, Vocal & Instrument/Tabla/ etc.) and the Bachelor of Fine Arts (Painting/Applied Arts/Sculpture/ etc.).
15. Major and Minor shall be awarded on fulfilment of the following conditions: For Major, 64 credits in a 3-year & 84 credits in a 4-year UG programmes in a single Major Discipline. For Minor 28 credits in 4-year UG programmes in a single Minor Discipline.
16. The Dissertation and Project will start in the VII semester. However, the evaluation and assessment will be conducted in both the VII and VIII semesters.

6. CHOICE-BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS) UNDER ANNUAL SYSTEM FOR UG PROGRAMME

The CBCS provides an opportunity for the students to choose courses from the prescribed courses comprising core, elective or skills-based courses. The courses can be evaluated following the grading system, which is considered to be better than the conventional marks system. Therefore, it is necessary to introduce a uniform grading system in the entire higher education in India. This will benefit the student to move across institutions within India, to begin with across countries. The uniform grading system will also enable potential employers to assess the performance of the candidates. In order to bring uniformity in the evaluation system and computation of the cumulative grade point average (CGPA) based on students' performance in examinations, the UGC has formulated the guidelines to be followed.

6.1 Outline of Choice Bases Credit System

1. Discipline-Specific Core (DSC) Course: A course, which should compulsory it be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is termed a Core course

2. Elective Course: Generally, a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables exposure to some other discipline/subject domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course.

2.1 Discipline-specific Elective (DSE) Course (2 each of regular courses): Elective courses may be offered by the main discipline/subject to study is referred to as Discipline Specific Elective. The University/institute may also offer discipline-related Elective courses of an interdisciplinary nature (to be offered by the main discipline/Subject of study).

2.2 Dissertation/Project Work: An elective course chosen of 6 credits, designed to acquire special/advanced knowledge, such as supplement study/support study to project work, and a candidate studies such a course on his own. Advisory support by a teacher/faculty member is called dissertation/project work. A project/Dissertation work may be given instead of a discipline-specific paper.

2.3 Generic Elective Course (GEC): An elective course chosen generally from an unrelated discipline/subject, to seek exposure to other subjects/disciplines is called a Generic Elective Course.

P.S.: A core course offered in a discipline/subject may be treated as an elective by another discipline/subject and vice versa and such electives may also be referred to as Generic Electives.

3. Ability Enhancement Course (AEC)/Competency Improvement Courses/Skill Development Courses

Foundation Course: The Ability Enhancement (AE) Courses may be of two kinds AE Compulsory Course (AECC) and AE Elective Course (AEEC). "AECC" courses are courses based on the content that leads to knowledge enhancement. They [(I) Environment Science, (ii) English/MIL Communication] are mandatory for all disciplines. AEEC courses are value-based and/or skill-based and are aimed at providing hands-on training, competencies, skills, etc.

3.1 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC): Environmental Science, English Communication

3.2 Skill Enhancement Course (SEC) (Minimum 4): These courses may be chosen from a pool of Courses designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based instruction.

7. ELIGIBILITY:

7.1 BA/B.Com. 1st Year:

I. A pass in the Senior Secondary (10+2) examination (Academic Stream) conducted by the HP Board of School Education or an examination accepted as equivalent thereto by the various bodies of the H.P. University.

II. Minimum percentage for admission:

(a) B.A. 1st Year: 33% (however a student can opt for mathematics in B.A. 1st Year only if he/she has studied it in 10+2 and has obtained 45% marks in mathematics or 45% marks in aggregate).

(b) B.Com. 1st Year: 45% (however it is 40% for those who have passed 10+2 from the commerce stream and for the girls candidates, it is 33%).

A relaxation of 5% marks for SC and ST students for admission to the commerce faculty will be given.

7.2 BA/B.Com. 1st /2nd /3rd Year:

Admission will be based on a roll-on system. A student who has been expelled or rusticated from any college will not be eligible for admission to any course without the prior approval and permission of the Vice Chancellor. While determining percentage of marks for eligibility, rounding up of fraction of 0.5% marks or above to the next full unit is permissible. The above condition of minimum percentage is subject to Sardar Patel University, Mandi amendments from time to time. If a student does not produce the actual marks sheets from the Board/University in respect of 10+2 where the result is shown in grades of the equivalent exam, standards, etc., the minimum

percentage of marks for each grade/standard will be taken into consideration while determining his/her eligibility for the purpose of admission.

A candidate from the National School of Open Learning will be eligible for admission to B.A. 1st Year only if he/she has passed all five subjects including English (as per Ordinance of SPU Mandi).

For fresh admission to the first year of the Course, the **maximum age limit is 23 years** on the first of July of the year concerned. In the case of **SC/ST** candidates a **relaxation of three years** is allowed. The Vice-Chancellor, SPU Mandi, may be recorded in writing to give relaxation in age up to a maximum of six months to other candidates also. All such cases may be provisionally granted age relaxation of up to six months by the Principal of the college and a consolidated list of all such cases will be sent for the approval of the Vice Chancellor by 31st October of every academic Year. A candidate seeking admission to B.A./B.Com-1st year must have studied Mathematics and English at the 10th level. The maximum age limit for admission to B.A./B.Com-1st year classes for women students has been raised to 25 years by the SPU Mandi.

Note: 1. 10+2 students placed under compartment in the 10+2 class are not eligible for admission in the first year of three-year degree programmes in Arts/Commerce.

10. For the Degree:

a) The candidate shall have to undergo the prescribed course of study for a period not less than three academic years (and not more than five academic years) to pass the examination prescribed and fulfill such conditions as have been prescribed therewith.

b) For the degree, the students will have to accumulate a minimum of 132 successful credit hours of course work in annual system and is a minimum of 128 successful credit hours of course work in semester system. Not more than three attempts will be allowed to pass a course.

Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA)

CCA Scheme: For students enrolled for the Academic session 2019-20 onwards (Annual System), CCA will account for 30% of total marks i.e. 100, which a student will get in a course. The breakup of 30%, i.e. 30 marks is given below.

It is approved that a student will have to pass both the components i.e. CCA and ESE separately to become eligible to be declared successful for the course.

Mode of conducting Minor Test (15 Marks): Minor test will be conducted after the completion of 48 teaching days (8 weeks).

(A) Three Types of questions will be set in Minor Test:

1. 5 MCQ (Choice: 1 out of 4) and True/False type of questions of one mark each = 5 marks
2. 2 questions of short answer type of 2.5 marks each = 5 marks
3. 1 question of about 500 words = 5 marks

Total of minor test = 15 Marks**(B) Distribution of marks for evaluation of Tutorial/Home Assignment etc.:**

1. 5 marks are assigned for the quality of contents and structure of the assignment.
2. 5 marks are assigned for the clarity of language of the script (Hindi/English) and its presentation in the class room.

(C) Classroom attendance=5 marks

Each student will have to attend a minimum of 75% lecture tutorials and practical. A student having less than 75% attendance will not be allowed to appear in the Annual Examinations / End-Sem. Examinations (ESE).

11. Grievance and Redressal Mechanism

1. **Right to Appeal:** Students have the right to make an appeal against any component of evaluation. Such appeals must be made to the **Principal of the College** on a prescribed form, clearly stating in writing the reason(s) for the complaint/appeal.
2. **Committee Review:** The appeal will be placed before the **Grievance Redressal Committee (GRC)**, chaired by the College Principal.

Committee Composition (Core and Elective Subjects):

- Head of the Department
- Course Teacher
- A senior teacher of the department

Note: The committee will consider the case and may give a personal hearing to the appellant before making a final decision. **The decision of the committee is final.**

12. Mandatory Admission Requirement

As per the strict instructions of the **Government of Himachal Pradesh** (based on the ruling of the **Hon'ble Supreme Court**), it is **mandatory** for the candidate to be accompanied by one of his/her parents at the time of admission.

9. **Previous Result:** An attested copy must be submitted to the college office within **10 days** of the result declaration by SPU Mandi.

14.1 Specific Requirements

- i) **Private/Gap Students:** Must submit a recent character certificate (less than 6 months old) issued by an MLA, Gazetted Officer, SDM, Tehsildar, or Naib-Tehsildar.
- ii) **Reserved Categories:** SC/ST certificates must be issued by a **Magistrate (Class-1)**.
- iii) **Gap Years:** An **affidavit** stating the reasons for the break in continuity is mandatory.
- iv) **Tuition Fee Exemption:** **Only** girl students who are Bonafide Himachali are eligible for tuition fee exemption.

14.2 Candidates from Other Boards/Universities

Students who passed their previous examination from a board other than HP Board/University must submit:

- a) **Eligibility Certificate:** Showing equivalence of courses from H.P. Board/University.
 - b) **Original Migration Certificate.**
 - c) **Detailed Marks Sheet (DMC)** of the exam passed.
 - d) **Original Character Certificate** from the previous institution.
 - e) **Original Documents:** All originals must be produced for verification during the admission/interview.
- Warning:** Admission without these documents is purely provisional and at the candidate's own risk.

15. Re-Admission

Scenario	Rules and Penalties
i) Continuous Absence	If a student is absent for more than 10 continuous days without permission, their name will be struck off the rolls.
Re-admission Fee	1st Time: Rs. 100/- 2nd Time: Rs. 200/- (plus fines). No re-admission allowed after the second time.
ii) Attendance Shortage	If struck off due to low attendance, the student must seek re-admission within 4 days .

16. Change of Subjects

- **Timeline:** Subject change is only permitted in the **1st Year** within **7 days** of the start of teaching.
- **One-Time Option:** A student can change their subject **only once**.
- **Eligibility:** Change is allowed only if the student meets the required percentage of marks for the new subject/faculty.

17. Procedure for Change of Subject

1. **Application:** Must apply in duplicate to the Principal.
2. **NoC:** A "No Objection Certificate" is required from the concerned Teachers/HOD.
3. **Right to Refuse:** The college may refuse admission to specific courses if human or material resources (staff or space) are unavailable.

18. Migration Rules

- Governing Body:** Migration is governed by **SPU Mandi** rules.
- Registration:** No migration certificate is issued unless the student is already registered with the university.
- Required Documents:**
 - a) Lecture Attendance statement (countersigned by the Principal).
 - b) Statement of marks from previous Term Exams.
 - c) Character Certificate from the previous Principal.
- Timeline:** The student must join the new college within the university's stipulated time.
- Fees:** The first college is entitled to the tuition fee for the month the migration is sanctioned.
- SPU Mandi Regulations:** Admissions for students migrating from other universities or affiliated institutions are governed by the regulations framed by the **E.C. of SPU Mandi**.
- Provisional Status:** Migration from another university is treated as **provisional** until the student produces the official Migration Certificate and a Conduct Certificate from their previous institution.
- Disqualification:** Any student disqualified by another university will **not** be granted admission during their period of disqualification.

19. Specific Rules of Admission & Migration

Rule	Detail
i) Inter-University (Part II)	The Principal must be satisfied (via teacher recommendations) that the student's previous syllabus is equivalent to SPU Mandi's. If not, the student may be required to study an additional paper or be refused admission. All cases require final H.P.U./S.P.U. approval .
ii) Mutual Agreement	For inter-college migration, the Head of the receiving institution must agree to the migration before university approval.
iii) Conduct Disclosure	When attesting migration forms, the previous institution must clearly state if the student was ever detained or faced serious disciplinary action (e.g., rustication or expulsion).
iv) 15-Day Deadline	Students must join the new college within 15 days of the migration certificate's issue date. If late, the entire process and fee deposit must be repeated.
v) Non-Refundable	Migration fees are not refundable under any circumstances.
vi) Cancellation	If a student decides not to migrate after the certificate is issued, they must apply for cancellation through their Principal to the Registrar/Controller of Exams.

20. Applying for Leave

- i) **Recommendation:** All leave applications must be recommended by **all concerned teachers** before submission.
- ii) **Regularity Check:** Teachers will only recommend leave if the student has been regular in attending classes.
- iii) **Principal's Approval:** Any leave exceeding **3 days** requires the Principal's sanction and is only granted in special circumstances.
- iv) **Attendance Impact:**
 - Students are marked **absent** during leave.
 - Leave periods count as absences when calculating eligibility for university exams.
 - **Benefit:** If leave is properly sanctioned, the student's name will **not** be struck off the rolls, and no absence fines will be levied.

21. Tutorial Groups

Upon completion of admission, students are randomly assigned to tutorial groups. **Tutors** assist students in goal setting, maintaining discipline, and staying on academic track.

22. Scholarships and Fee Concessions

- **Eligibility:** Only students who passed their previous class are eligible. Latest notifications are posted on the college notice board.
- **Application:** Forms are filled online. Hard copies must be attested and submitted with documents (Income, Caste, Aadhaar, Bank Details, etc.).

23. Discipline and Conduct

- **Property:** Defacing walls or damaging furniture is strictly prohibited.
- **Substances:** Use/possession of **narcotics or tobacco** is strictly prohibited and subject to legal action.

24. Menace of Ragging

Ragging is a criminal offense per the Supreme Court of India. It includes any physical or mental torture.

- **Penalties:** Expulsion, suspension, public apology, withholding of scholarships, or criminal legal proceedings.
- **Undertaking:** All students and parents are deemed to have signed an undertaking agreeing to these rules upon admission.

25. College Identity Card

- **Lost Card:** Loss must be reported immediately to college authorities with a **police report**.
- **Duplicate Fee:** A fine of **Rs. 30.00** plus **Rs. 10.00** for the cost of the card will be charged.

26. Library

- **Facilities:** Enriched with textbooks, magazines, newspapers, and seating arrangements for students and staff.
- **Security Deposit:** All students must pay a **Library Security of Rs. 100/-** at their first entry.
- **Refunds:** Refundable until **31st March** of the year after passing out or leaving. No refunds are issued after this date.

Ragging—A Punishable Offence

If an individual or a group of students gives mental or physical torture to a new student because of which he/she is afraid or unable to pursue his/her studies in an academic atmosphere, it shall be treated as **ragging**.

Any student found involved in ragging will be punished appropriately. The punishment may include:

1. **Expulsion** from the College/University.
2. **Suspension** from classes.
3. **Fine** accompanied by a public apology.
4. **Withholding** of scholarships or other student benefits.
5. **Ban** on representing the college in various sports or cultural events.

Legal proceedings under criminal law shall be initiated. Any person, who is found to contravene the provisions of section (I) of Himachal Pradesh Education Institution (Prohibition of Ragging) ordinance, 2009 shall on conviction, be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend up to three years or fine which may extend up to fifty thousand rupees or both.
